- 8. **Annual General Meeting** This will be held at the beginning of the next meeting (9 March). Jim Madden will Chair the AGM. If you were not at the last meeting and would like a nomination form to fill in or you'd like to nominate for a position please let me know, I will email you one, or I can fill it in for you and bring it along. All positions to be declared vacant. Unavoidably, our President can't make the AGM although she's happy to renominate for President. Therefore, the honours are up to me. # 9. Autumn Show & Market Day – 4 May 2024

4 May – set up the afternoon before in the Hall. Our Judges to be Meryl Windsor and Amanda Mead. Members to start potting to make for a successful plant market day (and all things garden) please. This year with two Judges for our Autumn and Spring Shows as well as increasing what our club pays judges/guest speakers for travel costs – we have added costs to cover, and these two events (Autumn & Spring Shows) are our main fund raisers for the year. I will begin organising the raffle in March.

## 10. Guest Speaker

Our guest speaker was Rod Nicholls (capably assisted by Kylie). Rod gave a comprehensive talk on his propagating methods and what he uses for his method. Briefly, Rod grows everything from cuttings. Rod says the main reason plants die is OVERWATERING. Rod finds gerberas grow better in pots – better drainage - (pots can be moved out

of too much rain). He grows his doubles from seed. He feeds with blood & bone and potash (liquid) for flowering. When the pot is quite "full" of lots of crowns – it's time to break up the plant to make more gerberas. Rod recommends spraying with Mancozeb Plus but to spray under the leaves as well as the tops of the leaves. Rod himself, in a bad infestation uses a systemic bug killer which is not available from the big green warehouse but places such as Farmcraft. He gave us some helpful tips on preparing plants for shows/ judging with a few little tricks that the Judges may not notice. Rod likes to strike his rose cuttings in sharp sand (also known as grit and river sand) with hormone powder (and he prefers power over gel). Rod showed us an example of how he takes multiple cuttings from a cordyline. Very informative and interesting speaker. Rod had plants to sell as well. Thank you so much for taking the time to travel down and speak with us Rod and Kylie.

### 11. Show Bench Schedule

President mentioned to keep up with the changing times and trends it had become popular for people to grown plants in Leca (marble sized clay balls) in water and/or plants in water. There is no class for these in our schedule. Further discussions needed to include these and perhaps other plants that don't quite have a category into our show schedule.

## 12. Pots

A large number of pots have been donated to our Club.



all brand new -100 ml pots and 140 ml pots. As we need to increase revenue this year to cover increased costs, it has been decided to offer them to members in exchange for a donation to the Club. There were well in excess of 400 of the larger size and 640 of the smaller size. Some pots were at the meeting last week. To members of the IHSI - the pots are to be sold at a very cheap price of small pots -10 pots for \$1.00 donation to our Club, the larger size, 3 pots

for \$1.00 donation to our Club. A large number of the pots have already been claimed by a member for a donation to our Club – that leaves us with about 100 of the larger pots and about 140 of the smaller pots, give or take. I read interestingly in the latest Organic Gardener Mag that not only is the watermelon fruit edible but so is the "rind". I've never seen a recipe using watermelon rind. Also, our daylilies are a versatile edible – they can be stuffed

and battered like zucchini flowers or tossed through salad (remove the stamens) and when dormant the tubers can be harvested like a potato. Apparently the young shoots are delicious steamed or blanched! I'd rather enjoy them in the garden (many lilies are toxic so need to be correctly identified).

And let's all hope we have seen the back end of the horrendous heat and humidity this summer. It's been difficult to cope with.
